Vision

To be a world class research center producing cutting edge research in Economics and disseminating ideas and solutions for sustainable and equitable development, particularly for the poor, women and other vulnerable groups.

Mission Statement

CREB's mission is to:

- Produce high quality research with meaningful policy impact, build capabilities of its researchers, and engage with academics, practitioners and policy makers on issues of importance for economic development in Pakistan and the world.
- Contribute to Lahore School's overall mission by supporting high quality research of its graduate programs, ensuring that its researchers meet the international ethical standards, effectively managing its Research Development Fund grants programme and ensuring that international conferences participated by faculty under its training programme meet its academic standards.

Objectives:

CREB's objectives are to:

- Continuously improve the quality of its research by expanding links with international researchers and encouraging publications in higher ranked academic journals by its staff.
- Expand its portfolio of research projects funded from competitive external grants.
- Disseminate research and promote discussion with policy makers, academics and other stakeholders on economic development issues by organizing international conferences and seminars, publishing working papers, policy papers, briefs, newspaper articles and blogs.
- Develop skills of its staff, especially early career researchers, by mentoring and organizing training workshops, encouraging participation in external capacity-building workshops, academic conferences and seminars, as well as facilitating access to resources for research.
- Provide a dynamic, collegial and inclusive work environment.
- Provide timely and quality support to the Lahore School for:
 - I. Maintaining high quality of its graduate programmes.
 - II. Ensuring compliance with best practices of research ethics.
 - III. Effective use of its funding for research and faculty participation in international conferences.

Research Review: 2020 – 2024

CREB focused on three main fields of research: Political economy; Education, health and labor force participation; and Industrial innovation and agglomeration, with a cross cutting focus on gender and climate change. A significant portion of the research in the last two areas involves field experiments to provide a robust measurement of impact. In 2024, CREB staff published **2** articles in impact factor journals. In the 5 years (2020-2024), CREB staff have:

- Produced **59** publications, including **15** journal articles of which **13 were in impact factor journals** and **2** in X category journals, **17** international working papers and other international publications, and **12** CREB Working Papers and other local publications (see Table 1, and Tables 1-8 in the Statistical Annexure I for details).
- Obtained external grant funding of £ 425,638 for 14 research projects,
- Supervised 10 MPhil theses 3 MS theses and 5 PhD theses.

- Organized 7 international Conferences: 2 on the Management of Pakistan Economy, 1 on Behavioral Economics and 4 on Applied Development Economics (ADE).
- Collaborated on joint research with researchers from some of the leading International universities, including University of Oxford, University of Chicago, Stanford University, Duke University, Bocconi University, Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Harvard Kennedy School.

In 2018, the Lahore School set up a Research Development Fund (LSRDF). The LSRDF is managed by CREB and the proposals received for research grants are subjected to a rigorous evaluation process. Since 2020 3 research projects have been funded by LSRDF (see Statistical Annexure 1, Table 6b). A research article based on the project titled Underdog Entrepreneurship: A Model to Predict Entrepreneurial Capabilities and Success in the Condition of Poverty, funded by LSDRF **in 2023**, was published in an impact factor journal. In 2022, CREB launched a new initiatives of Short-term Resident Fellowship program and CREB Development Research Seminar series.

Short-term Resident Fellowship Program: This fellowship provides an opportunity for young scholars to engage in collaborative, high quality applied research, expand their networks, and enhance their research and professional skills. In 2022- 2023 CREB hosted Sakina Shibuya (a Ph.D. student in Agricultural and Applied Economics at the University of Wisconsin, Madison). During her stay at the Lahore School, Sakina worked with Zunia Tirmazee (Senior Research Fellow and Assistant Professor) to develop a project titled "Understanding the Costs of Hiring Women in Pakistan" for which they received funding from both IGC and PEDL. The project aimed to understand the firm-side constraints to hiring women. In addition to the research, Sakina also conducted two workshops aimed at capacity building of young researchers at the Lahore School. She delivered one session on developing code for reproducible research and another one on using GitHub for facilitating collaborative research. In 2023- 2024, CREB hosted Rebecca Wu (Third year Ph.D. student at University of Chicago) as a resident fellow. During her stay at the Lahore School, Rebecca worked with Zunia Saif Tirmazee and Hamna Ahmed (Senior Research Fellows and Assistant Professors) on a project

"Online Labor Market of freelancers in Pakistan". The project aimed to understand how to improve freelancers' access to global markets and increase their earning potentials. University of Chicago has provided a grant of \$5000 for exploratory work on this project and a proposal for additional funding has been submitted to IGC. In addition to research, she conducted five in person workshops on Data for Empirical Analysis at the Lahore School for CREB staff, Economics and Business faculty and graduate students.

CREB is currently in the process of reviewing and processing applications for the Short-Term Resident Fellowship for the 2024-2025 period

Sixth International Conference on Applied Development Economics (ADE 2024): CREB and the Innovation and Technology Centre (ITC) hosted the 6th International Conference on Applied Development Economics (ADE), as an in-person event in Lahore, from 15 – 17 August 2024.

The Conference aimed to (i) highlight recent research that can have lasting policy impact for sustainable growth in the developing world; (ii) provide early career researchers the opportunity to obtain feedback on their on-going work; and (iii) to start a mutually beneficial exchange of ideas and discussions among researchers on potential collaborations.

ADE 2024 featured plenary talks by Adrienne Lucas (University of Delaware) and Jonathan Morduch (New York University) and included presentations from international and local researchers working on issues related to economic development and sustainable growth in the developing world. The conference had a total of 25 presenters from which 15 were international and 10 were from Pakistan. The Conference broadly focused on the following thematic areas:

Labour Markets, Industry and Trade, Political Economy and Institutions, Education and Health and Climate Change with a crosscutting emphasis on gender.

CREB also supported the faculty of Economics for its MS/MPhil economics program. Headed by the CREB Senior Research Fellow, Waqar Wadho, the economics graduate program is revamped with the introduction of four specializations (Theory/Quantitative Economics, Development Economics, Trade and Public Policy, and Data Analytics) in MS/MPhil program. CREB continued its Lahore School research support activities such as RA/internship opportunities for undergraduate students to stimulate their interest in economic research by accommodating 10 student interns in the summer and 6 student RA's during the spring and fall semesters in 2024; managing the research ethics review process for all research projects; and screening faculty funding applications for participation in international conferences.

Lastly, various research projects carried out at CREB during this time period helped to bridge the divide between academics and public policy practitioners. These projects involved collaborative work between Lahore School of Economics and Government agencies such as Punjab Skills Development Fund (PSDF) and Small and Medium Enterprise Development Authority (SMEDA) which was initiated after signing of an official MoU between respective parties. Details of these MoUs are listed below:

Punjab Skills Development Fund (PSDF)

A Memorandum of Understanding was signed in February 2023 between Lahore School of Economics and Punjab Skills Development Fund (PSDF), the largest skills development fund in Pakistan, set up by the Government of the Punjab in collaboration with Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO). The objective of this memorandum was to conduct research and create evidence-based development programs that will accelerate the socio-economic abilities of female citizens and encourage female labor force participation (FLFP).

Small and Medium Enterprise Development Authority (SMEDA)

A Memorandum of Understanding was signed in February 2024 between Lahore School of Economics and Small and Medium Enterprise Development Authority (SMEDA), a statutory body under the Ministry of Industries and Production, Government of Pakistan. The objective of this collaboration is to carry out research pertaining to growth of SMEs especially focusing on, but not limited to, broad areas such as formal and informal financing of the SME sector, business formalization and informality aspects of SMEs, women entrepreneurship etc. Research activities under this new collaboration will be based on administrative data as well as field work.

Five Year Research Programme 2025-2029.

Over the next five years CREB will continue its efforts to raise the quality and sustain the volume of its research in the period 2024-2029. Keeping in mind the small number of CREB staff, our planned output for 2024-2029 is less than what was achieved in the last five years (for the number of resident CREB research staff today see Table I, Statistical Annexure II). In the period 2025-2029, CREB staff plan to publish 15 papers in impact factor journals and produce 10 international working papers, CREB working papers and other international and local publications. Depending on the success of the ongoing efforts to revive the Lahore School's MPhil and PhD programs in Economics, CREB staff expect to supervise 15 MPhil/MS theses in this period. In addition, CREB staff will complete 8 ongoing externally funded research projects and initiate 6 new projects. CREB will also organize 5 international conferences, and 30 seminars with leading academics and field experts as speakers; conduct 10 skills training workshops; host at least 5 early career international researchers; and expand its student outreach programme (see Table 2 for details).

CREB staff will continue its existing initiatives and its flagship ADE conference, with the purpose of capacity building of Lahore School faculty and enhancing their exposure to recent economic developments and latest cutting-edge research methods.

- I. **Short-term Resident Fellowship Program**: CREB plans to continues its Short-term Resident Fellowship program. CREB is currently in the process of reviewing and processing applications for the Short-Term Resident Fellowship for the year 2024-2025.
- II. **Conferences**: This year the 7th annual Applied Development Economics (ADE) conference is planned to be held in person in August 2025. The conference will broadly focus on the following thematic areas: Labour Markets, Industry and Trade, Political Economy and Institutions, Education and Health, and Climate Change with a cross-cutting emphasis on gender.
- III. **Research projects**: Work will continue on projects initiated during 2024 for which external grant funding is received.

• Ongoing Research projects:

From Jobs to Careers: Lifting Constraints to Women's Career Advancement in South Asia: This project is funded by Gender Growth and Labour Markets in Low Income Countries Programme (G2LM|LIC) and is being carried out by CREB staff member Hamna Ahmed in collaboration with researchers from University of Texas A&M (Raymond Robertson and Danila Serra) and Indian Statistical Institute (Farzana Afridi).

Inclusive Growth in Pakistan's Transition to the Green Economy: This project is funded by University of Texas A&M and is being carried out by CREB staff member Hamna Ahmed in collaboration with researchers Raymond Robertson and Danila Serra.

Exploring the incidence of informal lending on SME financing and development in Pakistan: This project is funded by the Farma-Miller Center and is being carried out by CREB staff members Hamna Ahmed and Zunia Saif Tirmazee in collaboration with researchers from University of Chicago (Emma Zhang) and SMEDA.

Competition and Market Access in Online Freelancing Markets: Evidence from Pakistan: This project is funded by the International Growth Centre (IGC) and the Weiss Fund and is being carried out by CREB staff members Hamna Ahmed and Zunia Saif Tirmazee in collaboration with researchers from University of Chicago (Rebecca Wu).

Informed Job Searching: How Access to Information Shapes job search behaviour: This project is funded by Gender and Labor Markets in Low Income Countries Programme and is being carried out by CREB staff members Hamna Ahmed and Zunia Saif Tirmazee in collaboration with researchers from World Bank (Kate Vyborny) and Bates College (Nivedhitha Subramanian).

Managers' and Households' Attitude Toward Women Working in Factories: Role Model Firms and Information Interventions in Pakistan: This project is funded by Private Enterprise Development in Low Income Countries (PEDL) and is being carried out by CREB staff member Waqar Wadho in collaboration with researchers Abu Siddique (Royal Holloway University of London) and Anri Sakakibara (Technical university of Munich)
